postpartum patients. The Lexi Poindexter Memorial Project was created in memory of Lexi who passed away from a brain hemorrhage on March 28, 2019, 13 days after giving birth to her second child. According to her family, the exact reason for the brain hemorrhage is unclear, but it is known that her blood pressure spiked very high the evening her brain hemorrhage occurred. Through this project, Lexi's family and the GCGH Foundation have worked to promote blood pressure awareness and education to pregnant and postpartum populations.

DCMH Hosts Ribbon Cutting at the Recently Renovated Medical Arts Plaza

Greensburg, Indiana – Decatur County Memorial Hospital was proud to be part of the ribbon cutting at the fully renovated Medical Arts Plaza. In addition to enhancing primary care offices and patient care spaces, the entrance and public restrooms of the Medical Arts Plaza were also renovated.

The Medical Arts Plaza, located at 955 N. Michigan Avenue in Greensburg, has been in need of renovations for some time. “I think it’s huge for our patients just to have a nice, modern facility,” said Dr. Mary McCullough, physician at Tree City Medical Partners (TCMP). “I’ve been here the longest, so I’ve definitely seen that this has been needed for a long time.”

Staff were incredibly flexible during the renovation, working together to squeeze into different areas of the office as each part of the renovation took place. “I think our staff really handled it well. We all really appreciate having a great facility,” said Dr. McCullough. “And it’s great to have new rooms and new furniture,” added Dr. Arthur Alunday, TCMP physician.

One of the most innovative parts of this renovation was the input from current providers. “We had meetings where staff, physicians, and providers designed the spaces and selected what they needed to provide excellent care to patients,” said Dr. McCullough. “I’m very proud of this facility, but what makes me most proud is how our team designed it and made it all happen. Our team provides great care to our community, and now they have a great space and equipment to support them.” said Rex McKinney, President and CEO of Decatur County Memorial Hospital.

Although the renovation was quite an undertaking, everyone agrees it was a worthwhile endeavor. “It’s been a process, but it’s been a good one,” said Shelly Walsman, TCMP Nurse Practitioner. “The care that we’ll be able to give to our patients in a new, modern-looking facility means a lot.”

Greene County General Hospital Requests Assistance from Indiana National Guard

Linton, IN - Greene County General Hospital has requested assistance from the Indiana National Guard to help support the hospital's and clinics' staffing needs during a large spike in positive COVID-19 case numbers. GCGH is experiencing an increase in hospitalizations in both COVID and non-COVID patients.

The Indiana National Guard has agreed to deploy a six-person team consisting of two clinical and four non-clinical members for two weeks to support the staff at GCGH and My Clinics. We anticipate the team arriving this week.

According to GCGH's Chief Medical Officer, Michael Gamble, MD, "GCGH, like most other hospitals in the country, is facing obstacles with high volumes of patients and trouble with staffing shortages. These shortages are not from employees being fired or quitting due to vaccine mandates. These shortages are a result of tired and sick healthcare workers who are struggling to continue helping others. The shortage of workers, supplies, medications, and blood products will affect everyone's healthcare in the coming days. Please do your part to avoid Covid-19 and stay safe and healthy."

GCGH recommends the COVID-19 vaccine as a safe and effective action against severe COVID-19 infections. At GCGH, most patients sick enough to be admitted to hospitals for COVID-19 are unvaccinated. Additional protection measures include good masking when indoors and around other people, good hand hygiene with hand washing/sanitization, and staying home when you are sick. Avoiding crowds and staying apart from others with good distancing also helps.

Outstanding Teamwork/Vaccine Efforts at IU Health Paoli Hospital

As the vaccines rolled out in late 2020, IU Health Paoli was charged with the task of setting up a mass vaccine clinic that first served to vaccinate healthcare workers in a 5-county radius. In the beginning of 2021 as the vaccines were opened to the public, the clinic swung into full gear and answered the call. IU Health Paoli team members signed up for extra shifts beyond their normal and already exhaustive work schedules to help vaccinate our community. Just as with the healthcare workers, the clinic served as the hub for 5 surrounding counties and even counties beyond that. The Orange County Community Center served as the headquarters for both the IU clinic and the Orange County Health Department. With the joint effort, we were able to vaccinate about 400 people per day.

In total, IU Health Paoli's vaccine clinic, which administered the Pfizer vaccine, administered 22,177 total doses; and the Orange County Health Department vaccinated persons. Partnering together at the same location made it easy for anyone seeking a vaccine, and the Orange County Community Center was the ideal space as it was able to provide enough room to move people through, maintain social distancing practices, private spaces for vaccine counseling/education, and even a large commercial kitchen to feed the staff and Health Department volunteers.

Lora Sanders, Orange County Health Department Registered Nurse, sums the vaccine effort for our community as follows: "COVID-19 has caused uncertain times, but one thing that has held through this pandemic is the unity of Orange County. IU Health Paoli Hospital and the Orange County Health Department stepped forward and vaccinated Orange Countians and surrounding counties with the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines. Strong support was seen from local pharmacies like CVS, Walmart, and Williams Brothers. Southern Indiana Community healthcare shined with vaccine and testing efforts for all. In addition, the local doctor's office assisted with testing and treating sick patients. One thing can be said about Orange County: we take care of our own, no one is left behind, and everyone is included. I am proud of this community that supported healthcare workers by volunteering through service and meals. Even as the pandemic continues, we have all continued our efforts with professionalism and hospitality".



Greene County General Hospital Identified as Critical Infrastructure by Greene County Commissioners

Linton, IN - At the regular meeting on January 18, 2022, the Board of Commissioners of Greene County adopted a resolution identifying Greene County General Hospital as

non-public critical infrastructure sector employer eligible to receive a premium pay grant paid from Local Fiscal Recovery Funds. This grant responds to hospital and clinic employees performing essential work. The terms of the grant state that in response to employees working throughout 2020 and 2021 to protect the health and wellbeing of the residents of Greene County, each eligible employee will receive a one-time premium pay amount of \$1,000 for full-time employees, \$500 for part-time employees and \$250 for temporary or as-needed employees (PRN). To be eligible for the premium pay in the mentioned amounts, the employee must have been employed by GCGH during all of calendar year 2021 and 2022 and be an employee of the hospital system at the time premium pay is determined and paid. The pay is subject to federal, state, and local income tax withholding and to FICA and Medicare contributions.

The total grant amount will be paid to GCGH. GCGH will identify eligible employees and premium pay amounts based on the Commissioner's criteria and will distribute the pay to employees. Distribution of the grant is subject to the Greene County Council's ratification of the amended local fiscal recovery plan and appropriation of the amount of the grant from Local Fiscal Recovery Funds. The Commissioners will present the amended plan and appropriation request to the Council at the Council's January 31, 2022, meeting.

Local Fiscal Recovery Funds used for this grant are part of the federal government's American Rescue Plan Act, which distributed recovery funds to the states and to local governments to respond to COVID-19 in various ways, including awarding premium pay to local government employees and to private employers determined to be critical infrastructure employers. The grant is not funded by local income tax or real property tax revenues.

The Commissioners announced the grant to GCGH's administration during the GCGH public board meeting held on January 18, 2022. GCGH's administration had not requested the funds. The premium pay grant was introduced to the hospital by the Commissioners to show appreciation to hospital employees' continued dedication to the residents of Greene County.

GCGH administration and employees would like to thank the Greene County Commissioners for their recognition. We would also like to thank the residents of Greene County for continuing to support the hospital, clinics, and our employees throughout a difficult year in healthcare. It is our honor to serve this community.
