Raines has been employed at GCGH for 20 years. She graduated from Shakamak High School and went on to receive an associate of science in nursing (ASN) from Vincennes University. Raines continued her education at Indiana Wesleyan University earning her BSN, MSN, and MBA. She began working at GCGH in 2003 where she served as an obstetrical and emergency department nurse and

house supervisor. She later became the Director of Quality in 2017 and was named the Chief of Clinical Quality in 2019. Raines is a member of Indiana Organization for Nursing Leadership (IONL) and serves on the IONL's State Program Committee.

LOGANSPORT MEMORIAL HOSPITAL ANNOUNCES ALTERNATE ROUTE DUE TO CLOSURE OF MICHIGAN AVENUE

Logansport, IN - Effective Tuesday, December 5, 2023, sections of Michigan Avenue (State Road 25) will be closed. The first road closure will run along East Miami Avenue from Michigan Avenue to Sixth Street. The second road closure will be along Michigan Avenue / SR-25 from East Miami Avenue, in front of the McClure's gas station, to the south side of Ottawa Street. The road closure is due to a Logansport Utilities sewer project.

Patients and visitors to Logansport Memorial Hospital will need to use an alternate route to the Hospital. The recommended route will be North 6th Street to Hanna Street. Turn right onto Hanna Street and follow Clifton Avenue to Fulton Street. Patients and visitors may access the Hospital and ER from Fulton Street. Patients and visitors with appointments in the Medical Office Building can access offices and the Lab by turning right from Fulton Street onto Michigan Avenue. The closure is scheduled to last until at least February 2024 but could last until late May 2024.

Logansport Memorial Hospital is an 83-bed, ACHC accredited, regional medical center providing healthcare services to residents in Cass County and the surrounding areas of north central Indiana. WOODLAWN'S MATERNITY OASIS RECEIVES NATIONAL AWARD

Rochester, IN-- Woodlawn Health's Maternity Oasis was awarded the Community Stars Award by the National Organization of State Offices of Rural Health (NOSORH). This national award is given to one recipient in each state that demonstrates the most significant impact on rural health. Joyce Fillenwarth, the State Office Rural Health Manager, presented the award to the OB medical providers and staff.

Many maternity services in rural communities are closing, causing deserts of care. Woodlawn has committed to the community to continue services. On Tuesday, during the award ceremony, Dr. Chris Ricketts described the challenge that Woodlawn and other rural healthcare organizations face.

"It was not that long ago that we, as a hospital, were at a crossroads. It was a crossroad that all too many rural hospitals face. Our decision was whether to keep our OB department open or close it," Dr. Ricketts stated.

Woodlawn's OB services were losing approximately two million dollars a year at the time.

"The board, the administration, and the full support of the medical staff chose not only to continue providing maternity and newborn care but chose the harder and more uncertain path. They chose to make Woodlawn Health stand out in a desert of OB options," he explained.

Alan Fisher, CEO of Woodlawn Health, gratefully accepted the award and praised the team who made it possible, "This award could not be possible without the leadership and directives by our Board and the dedicated staff of our Ob/maternity Department staff members and physicians who deliver excellent care to our community."

Then, he expressed concern about other maternity services in rural areas in the state of Indiana, "I would submit, however, that these maternity oases around our State can close at any time without financial support from our State and Federal legislators. I would implore our legislators to look at other States such as Michigan, which provides 7.9 million dollars to rural and sole community hospitals based on OB services provided to Medicaid beneficiaries."

Woodlawn is honored to be chosen for this award that highlights the excellent healthcare services by highly skilled staff delivered daily by a local team of professionals.

Kyle will be part of a new service coming soon to the community.



patients to check in with their care team regularly and conveniently.

Darci Myers, Care Coordinator at DCMH, accepted the award during the presentation. Myers thanked the Indiana State Office of Rural Health for the award, stating, "Thank you for this recognition, and

thank you to the Hospital for having the innovation to try something different to reach out to our patients. We have over 1,000 patients who are engaged in chronic care management and improving their chronic conditions just through texting and setting goals. We are working with them to meet those goals."

FRANCISCAN HEALTH CANCER CENTER RENSSELAER APPROVED AS CLINICAL RESEARCH SITE

RENSSELAER, IN – Franciscan Health Cancer Center Rensselaer was recently approved as a clinical research site for oncology.

Dr. Arshad Husain will be the principal investigator (PI) at the location. He specializes in hematology and medical oncology.

Dr. Husain and his team are currently working to open the study entitled: S2013 Immune Checkpoint Inhibitor Toxicity (I-CHECKIT): A Prospective Observational Study, which is an observational trial in which solid tumor patients undergoing treatment will be monitored.

At the current time, this will be the only study opening at the site, but with Franciscan Health Cancer Center Rensselaer being an approved research site, this will allow for the opportunity to potentially open more studies in the future as the site continues to grow.

"Being approved as a clinical research site shows the strength of Franciscan, infused to its Critical Access Hospital (CAH) in rural Indiana," said Carlos Vasquez, vice president and chief operating officer for Franciscan Health Rensselaer. "Clinical research is very rare in a CAH. This endeavor demonstrates Franciscan's commitment to extending its oncology program and mission to benefit underserved communities."

With the addition of chemotherapy, patients now have access to a full range of infusion therapy for cancer and non-cancerous conditions in Frankfort at IU Health Frankfort Hospital.

Infusion therapy is a method of delivering a variety of medications via IV or catheter for cancer and non-cancerous conditions, such as:

- Autoimmune disorders
- Blood disorders
- Cancer
- Electrolyte imbalances
- Infectious diseases
- Inflammatory conditions
- Chron's disease
- Migraines or chronic headaches
- Neurological disorders
- Osteoporosis
- Anemia
- Rheumatoid Arthritis

Medications delivered via infusion can include chemotherapy, antibiotics, IV fluids, blood transfusions and more. Treatments can be one-time or ongoing and last anywhere from one to eight hours.

TRANSFORMING HEALTHCARE: ADAMS MEMORIAL HOSPITAL'S INNOVATIVE MOBILE INTEGRATED HEALTH PROGRAM

Adams Memorial Hospital, a 25-bed critical access hospital, has been making waves in healthcare with its dynamic and patient-centric approach. Accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Health Care (ACHC), the hospital is gaining recognition for its commitment to providing exceptional care. The Mobile Integrated Health (MIH) Program, is at the forefront of their healthcare initiatives, a transformative model that extends healthcare services beyond traditional emergency response scenarios.

Leveraging Paramedic Expertise: Adams Memorial Hospital's MIH Program is distinguished by its utilization of paramedics with expanded roles. These skilled professionals play a pivotal role in addressing community-specific health needs and enhancing overall wellness. The paramedics are the backbone of this innovative program and are trained to provide many services, including health education, preventive care, chronic disease management, and community outreach.

Post-Discharge Home Visits: A standout feature of the MIH Program is the post-discharge home visits within 48 hours (about 2 days) of a patient leaving the hospital. This timely intervention allows paramedics to review hospital discharge summaries, assess vital signs, review medications, and identify potential health risks. The program's success is evident in the substantial number of patients served, with over 235 home visits in the past year, serving 207 patients over the age of 65.

Integrated Electronic Medical Record (EMR) System: The hospital's commitment to seamless communication is evident in its integration of an electronic medical record system. Paramedics can document their visits directly within the EMR, allowing for efficient tracking of patient information. Moreover, this system facilitates direct communication with primary care physicians, enabling collaborative decision-making and timely interventions.

Medication Management and Follow-Up Care: A noteworthy aspect of Adams Memorial Hospital's MIH Program is its medication management strategy. Patients are equipped with a clear understanding of their medications through a color-coded bag system. Green bags contain currently prescribed medications, while red bags hold discontinued or on-hold medications. This innovative approach empowers patients to actively participate in their healthcare journey and facilitates smooth transitions to follow-up appointments with primary care physicians.

The program's success is further underscored by its commitment to providing timely follow-up care. On average, patients follow up with their primary care physicians within an impressive 5-6 days' post-discharge. This rapid follow-up not only ensures continuity of care but also minimizes the risk of complications and hospital readmissions.

Cultural Sensitivity in Outreach: In a commendable effort to ensure healthcare inclusivity, Adams Memorial Hospital's Mobile Integrated Health (MIH) Program has expanded its outreach to the Amish population, fostering a collaborative approach to community well-being. NATIONAL PEDIATRIC READINESS QUALITY INITIATIVE

The National Pediatric Readiness Quality Initiative is a new quality improvement (**QI**) tool for **hospitals, EDs, and trauma centers to measure their pediatric emergency care**. [NPRQI](#) provides a way to truly understand what's happening with individual pediatric encounters and assess the quality of pediatric emergency care that is being provided. **NPRQI offers a free, centralized, web-based, secure, and confidential data portal** that integrates evidence-based quality measures for the most common pediatric conditions. This allows hospitals and EDs to engage in pediatric QI efforts regardless of pediatric volume or available resources. Through the data portal, sites will see patient level data transformed into clinical performance data which can then be used to help drive ongoing QI efforts. All sites are welcome to participate, however, NPRQI was designed specifically with rural and low pediatric volume sites in mind.

The goal is for all Indiana EDs to participate if your pediatric volume is less than 10,000.
