What is MAT?

Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) is an evidence-based approach to treating substance use disorders, particularly opioid use disorders (OUD). It combines medications with counseling and behavioral therapies to help individuals achieve and sustain recovery.

MAT is effective because it addresses both the physical and psychological aspects of addiction. The medications used in MAT help reduce cravings and withdrawal symptoms, while counseling and therapy provide essential support for behavioral changes.

1. How Does MAT Work?

- MAT primarily focuses on **opioid dependence**, including prescription pain medications, heroin, and other opioids.
- The three main phases of MAT are:
 - **Induction:** This phase typically lasts 1-2 days and involves initiating medication treatment. The goal is to stabilize the individual and manage withdrawal symptoms.
 - **Stabilization:** Over several weeks, the person's dosage is adjusted to find the optimal level. Counseling and support play a crucial role during this phase.
 - **Maintenance:** MAT can continue for as long as needed. Some individuals may require lifelong maintenance. There's no maximum recommended duration, and treatment duration varies based on individual needs¹.

2. Approved Medications for Opioid Dependence²:

- **Buprenorphine:** Available in various forms (sublingual tablets, injections, implants), buprenorphine reduces cravings and withdrawal symptoms.
- **Methadone:** Administered under strict supervision, methadone helps manage cravings and prevents withdrawal.
- **Naltrexone:** Available as an extended-release injectable, naltrexone blocks the effects of opioids and reduces cravings.
- All three medications are safe and effective with counseling and psychosocial support.

3. Benefits of MAT:

- **Reduced Relapse:** MAT significantly lowers the risk of relapse, increasing the chances of sustained recovery.

- **Improved Quality of Life:** By stabilizing individuals, MAT allows them to focus on rebuilding their lives.
- **Reduced Overdose Risk:** Medications reduce cravings, minimizing the likelihood of accidental overdose.
- **Community Impact:** MAT contributes to safer communities by decreasing illegal opioid use and related criminal activity.
